Chairman's Update

Here we are back in the much cooler and somewhat wetter days of Autumn with Winter fast approaching. We also seem to be facing somewhat testing times nationally although I have to say that fortunately at the Southam Heritage Collection the future does not look that bad.

The job is not a particularly demanding one in itself and anyone who is happy with numbers and ideally has had some exposure to Microsoft Excel should be able to carry it out without any problem – you certainly don't need to be a qualified accountant. We can provide training and support to anyone who might be interested, so please can I ask you to think about whether you could try taking on this role or maybe you have a neighbour or friend who would be interested? Please give it some urgent thought. Finally on this topic let me express my thanks to Pam for all her support and work for the Collection over nearly 17 years. We really are grateful for her significant contribution, and we wish her all the very best and we look forward to continuing to see her as she is remaining a member and volunteer.

As I write we have just opened our third exhibition of the year featuring the 2023 Calendar and we are very much starting to focus on the Christmas season. Winter Exhibition

This year our third exhibition is a little different in that it is a hybrid. Normally around the end of October we change the poster display to focus on the pictures included in the 2023 Calendar but this year we have done something a bit different.

Exhibition and placed them on one side of the room to form a permanent display, ideal for new residents and visitors to the town. Alongside, we have our annual





The County Museum Service inspectors agree that it is an important record of the life and times of our historic market town. The Collection is housed at Tithe Place in the centre of Southam, where it can be displayed, used and appreciated by the general public, local history societies, schools, reminiscence groups and researchers.

Christmas Exhibition focussing on the 2023 calendar. These interesting posters feature a large photograph of all 12 monthly pictures used from our archives with a further snippet of information, so you get double the benefit from a visit.

Of course, there are also the cabinet displays, the books and cards, raffle tickets and a large number of pre-owned history related books available for a small donation.


AGM & Committee Changes

The Annual General Meeting took place on Tuesday Oct 4th at the Congregational Church Hall in Wood Street.

We had 14 people attending and 18 apologies. Bernard presented the annual report and Pam gave an overview of the accounts which had been inspected (free of charge) by Grineaux Accountants from Market Hill. Merchandise sales now make up nearly 30% of our income so this area is becoming very important for our continued financial health. As usual our 'rent' to Orbit (via Stratford District Council) is our biggest expense, being around 85% of the total. The Management Committee was re-elected en bloc with the exception of Pam who was standing down. Following the formal proceedings we had good conversation with members over some refreshments.

Pam McConnell, Committee member of the Friends of the Cardall Collection, first as Secretary then as Treasurer, has stepped down from the Committee after nearly 17 years. Pam will continue offering support as a member and volunteer.

Winkless Mystery



Helen Morris, one of our Trustees and a long-time member of Collection the was looking through some items when she came across a copy of a neat handwritten letter. The letter was dated 1848 and had been posted in St Louis in the USA! It was addressed to members of the Winkless family in

Napton and was basically a letter home from a man who had emigrated to the US as a member of the Mormon sect. Helen was fascinated by the details in the letter and set about finding out more about the Winkless family.

After several years of hard work Helen decided to put down all she had discovered in a small book which is now available from the Collection. This book tells the story of Thomas Winkless and the troubled times he lived in and how he and his family ended up so far away from home.

Although Helen tried very hard she was unable to discover how the Collection had come by a copy of the letter and whether or not the original still existed. She was therefore thrilled to discover just a few weeks after publication of her book that the original did exist and was in fact in the possession of a lady living in Learnington. Having contacted the lady she has agreed to donate the original copy to the Collection, so we now have the original plus what is effectively the envelope. Based on the stamps on the envelope we see the letter was posted on May 1st, 1848, travelled 900 miles by horse probably to New York and crossed the Atlantic Ocean probably via a sailing ship to arrive in Liverpool by May 23rd 1848, followed by Leamington on May 26th 1848 - an incredible journey in such a short space of time.

It appears that the letter had been passed through the female lines for safe keeping, from Jean's great great grandmother through the Line, Goodwin and Fitchett families to reach her today. You can buy a copy of Helen's book at Tithe Place or online via our web site.

Southam Stories Sculpture

A number of people have been asking what has happened to the wooden Southam Stories Sculputure that stood just outside Tithe Place and had been errected at the Millenium, having discovered that it had suddenly gone missing!

No need to worry. Sadly the Sculpture had become quite badly damaged having been placed under



several trees and on a piece of ground which had a tendancy to retain water following rainstorms. This led to rotting of the wood both at the

very top of the Sculpture and in the feet in the ground. The Sculpture was in danger of becoming unsafe.

So one Saturday morning a group of volunteers got together and dismantled the Sculpture and loaded it into a van so that it could be taken back to the workshop where it was originally constructed.

The plan is that any rotting wood will be replaced and the Sculpture will be reinstalled a short distance away but this time on level concrete plinths to avoid it becoming waterlogged again. The work should have been completed by now but unfortunately it has been delayed. However it will be re-instated in the not too distant future and you will once again be able to see this unique monument from the High Street.

Window Displays

We are very fortunate in having two very large windows (one external and one in the Atrium) available to display information from the Collection elsewhere. This summer. or with the archaeological interest in what has been happening on HS2 and local housing estate land, we have featured displays including from Archaeology Warwickshire, Warwickshire County Council's commercial archaeology team through Hilary Calow. A recent display is still available in our Exhibition Room where you can read about the amazing Roman finds on the Flying Fields estate.

Recently as part of the Southam Book Festival window competition, Linda decorated the High Street window with a Civil War display depicting our "Battle of Southam 1642" book plus our latest book "The Winkless Letter Mystery". Our window received good reviews, which is our aim as well as supporting anything that goes on in the town



centre. We're happy to report that the winner of the competition was the Community Hub and Café window at Galanos House. Our display stall selling publications at the Southam Book Festival itself was really excellent in both sales and conversations. It is well worth your while taking a minute to


look in our windows as you go past since we try to make changes every couple of months.

Recent Acquisitions

As a museum we don't have a lot of space so we're careful not to aggressively pursue the acquisition of many new items, particularly large ones. However, that doesn't mean we aren't interested in having the opportunity to see things that people think could be relevant and then deciding whether or not they should be included in our collection. Below are three items that have come to our attention in different ways over recent months.

First there was an anonymous donation of a photograph which was left in a plastic bag outside our Exhibition Room door one morning. The photo apparently dates from 1918 and appears to be the Honours Graduates from St Johns College,



Cambridge. The photo does have the names of the men on it but unfortunately, they are all virtually illegible. We have been trying to identify the men in

the picture and also to understand the connection the picture has with Southam, but so far we are not making much progress despite help from St John's College itself. If you know anything about this photo or who may have donated it please contact us.

The second item was brought into the Exhibition Room one morning but unfortunately, we didn't make a note of who brought it in or ask any questions about it. The item is about 4 inches across and looks like it was a wooden container for a glass or perhaps a bottle but intriguingly on the reverse it says "Whist Drive 2nd Prize Nov 1946",



the number 173 and "Birdinbury German P.O.W. Camp" plus the initials which may be "J H R B". We have relatively little in the way of items from WW2 – apart from Rations Books and coupons and nothing relating to Prisoners of War. We really would like to know more about this item, such as who donated it; was it made by a PoW and is there a story attached to it connecting a local person to the PoW Camp at Birdinbury? If you know about this item, please get back in contact with us.

Earlier in this newsletter you will have read about the Winkless letter and how we have now been given the original letter. Below is a photo of the envelope portion of the letter – it is all a single piece of paper. This section shows the postage stamp



from the US and then, towards the top of the picture, the stamps upon arrival in both Liverpool and Leamington.

The address is also very brief in comparison with today – simply John Winkless, Napton, near Southam,

England - no mention of a postcode!
