Chairman's Update

Although 2022 is long over it is probably fair to let you know that from a Collection viewpoint 2022 was a pretty successful year. It wasn't without the usual set of problems but equally all things considered I think it can be seen as a significant success and I would like to express my considerable thanks to all our volunteers for their efforts in contributing to this success. Our volunteers make the Collection. Without them nothing would be possible. We are lucky to have a significant group of hard working and enthusiastic people giving their time and skills. Thank you all for your time, skills and effort.

One of the big successes at the end of 2022 was the sale of Christmas raffle tickets, partly due to the selling skills of volunteers in the Exhibition Room and partly due to the generosity of Tesco's who provided much of the first prize hamper which was significantly larger than previous years. Ticket sales numbers were fantastic.

The start of a New Year is nearly always something of an anti-climax after the excitement of the run-up to Christmas and the New Year celebrations but this year the problems were compounded by the closure of the Tithe Place Café in January. This produced a covid-like reduction in the number of people coming into Tithe Place which was not something we had expected. Now at the time of writing (end April) we still have a closed café, however we are hopefully optimistic that things are about to change significantly for the better and that by the end of May the café will be open once more under the management of a much more dynamic and entrepreneurial organisation. Keep your fingers crossed.

The cafe was not the only problem at Tithe Place. We also had major issues with the heating, but fortunately not quite so bad as some of the residents experienced. For some reason the underfloor heating went into shutdown and some residents and the Library were without heating during some of the coldest periods of the year. Fortunately, we are not reliant on the underfloor heating except in that it keeps the corridor outside the Exhibition room and the public toilets at a reasonable temperature. Major repairs have now been made to the heating system including replacing all the valves for the public areas of Tithe Place, which are situated in our Exhibition Room, and it appears that things are back to normal now.

In addition to the major Spring Exhibition featuring the Southam Workhouse (see later for more details) we also have two displays in our interior Atrium windows and our exterior window on High Street. The later features 4 large posters describing the impact of the English Civil War on the residents of Warwickshire including Southam.



If you get an opportunity take a look at these posters asap – there is a lot of information on them visible outside of our nrmal opening hours and they are on loan from another organisation so when they come down at the end of May we will not have access to it any more.



Southam Workhouse

The exhibition in Tithe Place on the Southam Workhouse, which was located on the site of Southam Primary School in Welsh Road, has been

well received and will close at the end of May. Research by our volunteers has been extensive and one, Roland Raffell, has been visiting Warwick Record Office on a regular basis for more information using old Southam records held there. This has resulted in a fascinating book which is now being finalised ready for publication.

Linda has also done a couple of informal talks on the subject to Southam and district groups, which have been well received raising funds towards keeping the rooms in Tithe Place open for us.

English Civil War Loss Accounts

Linda, along with some other local historians, was privileged to be involved in a Dugdale and Warwick Record Office Project researching the Warwickshire Loss Accounts from the 17th Civil War period held in the National Archives, and we have had 4 in-depth and very interesting posters up in our High Street window, available to read 24/7, depicting what the Loss Accounts are and what was found in them. This exhibition is supported with items in one of our display cabinets in the Exhibition Room, and will also remain open until the end of May. Don't forget, if you have young children there is an excellent £1 children's magazine available from us, as well as the comprehensive "Battle of Southam" book, also used by the Southam College students and teachers recently.

Summer Exhibition from June

Medical Matters

This exhibition, replacing the early 2023 exhibitions, will start at the beginning of June and is based on Dr Alastair Robson's excellent book on Dr Henry Lilley Smith and Southam's Eye and Ear Hospital, which was in Warwick House, once the Stoneythorpe Hotel, on Warwick Road.

Henry Lilley Smith was a medical practitioner in Southam and perhaps more importantly a prominent social reformer who engaged with his local and national counterparts to bring about dramatic improvements in the health care of the majority of the population. It can be argued that his continual belabouring of the need for reform of health care was a contributing factor in the development of ideas leading to the formation of the National Health Service.

Our display cabinets will contain items from Dr Smorfitt's medical bag, which is in our possession, and will be well worth a look. Plus, there will be some **Show & Tell** mornings hosted by Dr John Shenkman and Dr Robson, so look out for posters in our Tithe Place Exhibition Room door saying when these will occur. We also hope to have Dr John Wilmott give us a history talk on Warwickshire Dispensaries that came into being due to Lilley Smith. If there is enough interest, we may try out a members-only talk in our Project Room with Dr Robson and Linda. Please contact Linda if you would be interested in participating.

Southam Stories Sculpture

Southam Civic Ideas Forum (SCIF), headed by a very small but active committee with Len Gale as Chairman, have at long last organised the return and reconstruction of the refurbished wooden

Southam Stories Sculpture, that until autumn last year, had stood in the Tithe Place grounds in front of the Library. Sadly, weather had taken its toll, and the five feet,



legs and wood in general, had deteriorated so badly it had to be taken down and moved back to the sculpture, who spent the winter with it in his workshop cleaning and refurbishing it all.

Hence at the end of March, he was in the position of being able to supervise the replacement of the Sculpture back in the Tithe Place grounds, but this time on a new base provided by Terry Grey, on Park Lane instead. You can now come and see it

in all its glory, and if you've forgotten what was behind it all, we colour have books available in our Exhibition Room (£5) telling what's behind the stories or you can use the QR code in our window and on our web



site or Facebook, linking to an e-book which you can download and read for free.

Window Displays

Making full use of our Atrium and High Street windows, means we can provide 2 exhibitions and mini-displays at any one time.

Hence since January, in our large High Street window, we have mounted a comprehensive window display featuring the recent work done on the 17th C Civil War Loss Accounts. The pull-up posters used, have been provided by the group who organised the research with a Heritage Lottery Grant, at no cost to us, but providing us with a very comprehensive exhibition of quality and interest.

This has been so successful, we will look to see if any other museums or groups are able to loan us any other pull-up posters for display on a similar basis.

We have had some excellent mini-displays in our Atrium window as well in the last few years, and this window is open to any group or person, who would like to provide a minidisplay. Linda can help anyone interested in doing something, simply get in touch with her with your idea. It is easy to do, so don't be afraid to ask her!

The Atrium window is an ideal medium for advertising anything historical - in the past year we have displayed Jubilee Stories, new history books, archaeology from HS2 and new housing estates, family history and various Club anniversaries.

The TV in that window is also being used to good effect with short videos and moving pictures, and it is noticeable how many people (young and old) stop and watch the TV. The present video taken 10 years ago of the Battle of Southam is being followed by many as they look for familiar faces, places, and events from that weekend.

Dr Robson's book on HL Smith

Many of you will remember Dr Alastair Robson, from Southam Surgery and who is now retired. At our request, after he had researched and wrote a

fascinating book all about the Hatton Asylum near Warwick, he has spent the last three years researching Southam's very own special historical doctor, Henry Lilley Smith, and we now have his book available on our website and in our exhibition room (£12). However, I bet once you start reading about Dr Smith, you will not want to stop, the subject and book is so interesting.

Ladbroke Treasure Trail

This is a historical trail around the village of Ladbroke. One booklet provides the clues and information for a family or group of friends (children/adult) to take an unusual walk round the village. There is no treasure to win, but it is a good 2 or 3 hours entertainment, especially for youngsters. It costs £5 per book, of which £1 goes to a Southam School and the £4 is split between the Southam and Ladbroke Heritage charity groups. Ideal for a summer holiday day out with a picnic, or finish at the Bell Inn for a drink, lunch or dinner.

Ongoing Projects

The Exhibition Room is the Heritage Collection's window in that it is there that most people become aware of the work done by our volunteers. Indeed, we have four volunteers who attend for one or two mornings each week to interface with members of the public, explain about the current exhibitions and act as our salespeople for those who want to buy booklets, cards and other items we have on sale. In addition, there are at least two other people who attend on an as-required basis when perhaps our regular stewards have an appointment elsewhere or maybe on holiday. We are very grateful to all these colleagues for their ongoing support. Sadly, at the time of writing two of our stewards are actually in hospital suffering from various, what we hope are, minor problems. We wish them a speedy recovery and can't wait to see them back in action.

Behind the scenes there is much more ongoing activity which may or may not be visible to the general public. For instance, we still have a significant number of items which need cataloguing and recording either through photographs or scanning. There are four people currently working on these projects and they typically come into the Project Room at Tithe Place, on one or two mornings each week, where we have the necessary computers and equipment to perform these tasks. Some physical items like scythes can pose interesting challenges just because of their sheer size, whilst others may require a significant amount of time to work through just what the document, and it usually is a document, is actually describing. For instance, we have quite a large collection of Deeds relating to some of Southam's more interesting and older buildings. The picture below is an example of one such document. It is the title section of a document dated March 25th 1785 and describes the terms and conditions of a lease of property from a Charles P Packwood to a W Jos. Wells for 11 years for the sum of £41 per year.

The remainder of the document describes in very 'flowery' and probably legally correct language the details of the agreement. The parchment (and such documents are normally written on parchment), is approximately 3 feet by 2 feet in size and is usually one of a group.

We are trying to 'translate' these documents into easily readable English and then to piece together the history of whatever building or piece of land is involved. We have boxes of such deeds for places like the Black Dog Inn, the Flying Field estate, the Rookery and quite a few others and we have two people working in this area.

If you have any particular skills in reading or interpreting old English legal texts, or Wills, we would be very interested to speak with you and see if you could help our researchers, even if only on an occasional basis.
